Down Memory Lane Smile

Some more little chit chat that happened many years ago in the Wynnburg Grocery. Harry Lee said he remembers, "A customer came in and sort of walked to the back of the store. He stood there with his hand propped on items stacked there, nearly to the ceiling." As Harry Lee walked toward the storage room the customer asked, "Can you tell me where the flour is?" Hulon, a man who helped Harry Lee with different odd jobs in the store, walked to the storage room. He had been standing nearby. When Harry Lee got to the storage room, he saw Hulon, bent over, laughing. He didn't want the customer to see him laughing at him. The man who asked "Where is the flour?' Had his hand propped on one of the bags of flour. Hulon said, "Can you believe, he asked, where's the flour?" Sometimes, we can be searching for something and not realize it's right under our nose, like the time I searched everywhere for my sunglasses and they were on top of my head.

Harry Lee said he remembers Dan Throgmorton, a cousin and teacher, who had a sort of dry wit about him and he was always thinking up things to say. Well, he didn't have to think about them, because it just came naturally. Harry Lee said, "I remember one time when Dan was in the store, this fellow came in and it wasn't long before Dan had him cornered." Dan asked him, "Yancy, if eggs were three cents apiece, how many would it take to make a dozen?" Yancy stood there with a match stick, sticking out of each corner of his mouth. He crossed his arms, looked toward the ceiling and said, Mr. Dan, you sure can ask some hard questions." These are odds and ends of various memories with no particular order. This is another second hand memory. Harry Lee told me about this many years

ago and this memory was told to him, so I guess that makes it a third hand memory. His maternal grandfather, James Monroe Powers, was born in 1864 in Humphreys Co. and his grandmother, Ida Isabel Burton was born in 1875 in Benton Co. They raised four girls and 3 boys in Lake Co. Ida died in 1912 giving birth to twins and they died also. Most of the sons were hunters and their sons also. There was always wild game that some of them had killed and prepared for a meal. One day, Mr. James was visiting one of the family members and others had gathered for a meal. One of them called out, "Grandpa, stay and eat with us." So, he did. He sat down to eat and said, "This doesn't look and taste like chicken. The meat is too dark." One of the grandsons at the table spoke up and said, "Grandpa, that's not chicken, that's crow!" Mr. James pushed his plate back, stood up and looked around the table and said, "If my kids don't kill me, my grandkids will," and he walked out of the house with the sound of laughter trailing after him. There have been times when we goof-up, so to speak, and have to eat crow, but not this kind of crow.

One time, James Hearn stopped by the store. He asked Harry Lee, "Have you got some water around here?" Harry Lee told him, "There's a faucet outside, at the corner of the store. James got his water and drove off. He hadn't gone very far when he turned around and came back. "What in the world is in that water?" Is it going to kill me?" Harry Lee laughed and told him, "Well, it might be a little close to the gas tanks." Harry Lee had better water in the store, but this was his trick on James. James just laughed and said, "I'll know not to get water there, again. These things happened in days long gone by. Isn't it great that we can recall little things, bringing a smile to help brighten our day? Perhaps reading this will bring a smile to your face.





Alex Waldrop, "How the Kentucky Derby became a Quintessential American Event Steeped in Kentucky Lore"

Join Alex Waldrop as he discusses his time working in the horse racing industry at 10:30 a.m. Saturday, April 27, at the Calloway County Public Library at 710 Main St, Murray, KY 42071. The presentation is free to attend and centers around the history, tradition and the unique spectacle of the Kentucky Derby. Waldrop's presentation will enlighten the audience concerning the many reasons why the "Run for the Ros es" has grown into America's most prestigious annual horse racing event and what Forbes Magazine has described as one of the "Greatest Bucket-list Sporting Events" in America. Alex Waldrop is the former President and CEO of the National Thoroughbred Racing Association where for 15 years he led the Thoroughbred industry's national office with responsibilities for federal legislative advocacy, racing safety and integrity, and management of issues of national significance to Thoroughbred racing. Mr. Waldrop spent 13 years with Churchill Downs, Inc., as President and General Manager of Churchill Downs Racetrack (1999-2002); General Counsel (1992-1998), and Senior Vice President, Public Affairs (2003 -2004). He is also a former equity partner at the law firm of Wyatt Tarrant & Combs. Currently, Mr. Waldrop chairs the board of directors of the Racing Medication and Testing Consortium, a unique horseracing research, education and advocacy organization with representatives from all aspects and all breeds of horseracing. He also consults on state regulatory matters with both the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority (HISA) and the Horseracing Integrity and Welfare Unit (HIWU). Mr. Waldrop is a native of Mayfield KY and a graduate of the University of Kentucky College of Law. Recently, after 45 years living and working outside of Western Kentucky, he and his wife moved back to the region where they are now living on Lake Barkley in Canton KY overlooking the Land Between the Lakes National Recreational Area. MARTIN, TENN. – Curt Lynch, a junior computer engineering major from Dyersburg, was named the Spring 2024 Beth Maloan Outstanding UT Martin Student Employee Award winner at a student employee luncheon on the campus of the University of Tennessee at Martin.

Lynch is a teaching assistant in the Math Learning Center through the Department of Mathematics and Statistics, where he has worked since the Fall 2022 semester.

"He is a tutor, and he is brilliant," said Dr. Steve Elliott, the interim chair of the Department of Mathematics and Statistics. "He is also calm, and when you're working with people and trying to teach them math – a lot of people struggle with math and have anxiety about math.

'Curt is a calming pres-

ence when he works with students and faculty - with anybody with anything. He worked for many years managing fast-food restaurants, and he deals with customers and employees and manages to handle all that calmly."

Elliott added that Lynch takes the initiative on a lot of things.

"He volunteered to visit GENS 101 sections to advertise the Math Learning Center," he said. "That was his idea. Nobody said, 'Hey, Curt, go do this.' He came up with that.

"He also wrote a piece of software for us to track attendance in the Math Learning Center and, again, it was his idea."


to go above and beyond the job requirements.


DPA Partners with "Ride the Fault Line" to bring bicycle tour to Obion County

Discovery Park of America is partnering with organizers of the "Ride the Fault Line" bicycle tour to serve as "homebase" while participants are in Northwest Tennessee June 26 -28, 2024. 
